When the ancient World Heritage began to lose its status and began to be destroyed for hundreds of years, UNESCO took concern for its protection and came forward. So far, 1154 heritage sites in the world have been declared as World Heritage, including the heritage of India. Out of total 1,154 World Heritage Sites (897 cultural, 218 natural, and 39 mixed properties) exist across 167 countries. With 58 selected areas, Italy is the country with the most sites on the list.

Udaipur: Chief Minister Shri Ashok Gehlot was on Udaipur-Dungarpur Yatra. During this, he inspected the super specialty block of Maharana Bhupal Hospital in Udaipur and inquired about the well-being of the patients and injured being treated in the ICU located on the fourth floor there. First of all, the Chief Minister recently met the injured in the road accident near Nandeswar Ji on Jhadol

Road and got to know about their health; while talking to them, they inquired about the medical facilities and services being provided to these patients and their families and assured the injured that they would get well soon.

Taking information about the situation from the hospital management, RNT Principal Dr. Lakhan Poswal was instructed to provide necessary medical facilities to the injured along with proper treatment.

Chief Minister Gehlot directed the District Collector to immediately provide the assistance given by the State Government to the dead and injured in connection with this road accident.

Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot

said that the state government is serious about preventing road accidents in the state, and effective efforts are being made in this direction. Every year 10 thousand people in Rajasthan are victims of road accidents. The Chief Minister said that the roads have become very good in the state, modern and high-speed vehicles have come; people drive very fast. Hence the number of accidents has increased. People should drive carefully. It is also the responsibility of the media and voluntary organizations to create awareness among the public so that accidents can be reduced.

Divisional Level Workshop on Child

Protection

Udaipur: State Women and Child Development Minister Mamta Bhupesh said that as per the intention of Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot, making Rajasthan free from child labor and marriage is the priority. For this, along with the district administration, there is a need to make efforts together with the concerned departments, local public representatives, various voluntary orga-



nizations, and organizations working in child protection. ICDS Minister Smt. Bhupesh, during her visit to Udaipur on Monday, at Harishchandra Mathur Rajasthan Raj Public Training Institute expressed as the chief guest at the Divisional Level Workshop on Child Protection organized by the Department of Child Empowerment.

Discussions took place on several topics:

Minister Smt. Bhupesh discussed the working of juvenile homes, communication homes, and girl homes in this divisional level workshop and problems related to child trafficking, child labor, child marriage, child crime, child violence, migration of women in tribal areas, and child homes.

During the workshop, Dr. Shailendra Pandya, a member of the Rajasthan State Commission for Protection of Child Rights, gave detailed information about the various works being done in the field of child protection as per the instructions of the government and various schemes related to child welfare of the government to provide a safe environment to the children is needed to be taken down to the ground level. He emphasized making effective efforts in the field of child protection in the tribal areas of the Udaipur division.

District Collector Tarachand Meena, while welcoming the Minister Mrs. Bhupesh, apprised about the progress of public welfare programs

and work being done related to the Department of Women and Child Development in the Udaipur district. He told about the efforts being made at the district level for effective prevention of child marriage as well as other efforts being made for child protection. He said that under Mission Kotara, there is a need to work on the ground towards solving the problems of child labor and tribal areas and said that efforts are being made to remove the evils like child labor, and more than 10 thousand people in the district. There is a possibility of adding guardians. In the first phase, one thousand eligible candidates have been connected with the Palanhar scheme in Kotara.

Earlier, the Commissioner of Women and Child Development, Smt. Anuprana Singh Kuntal informed about the departmental activities, departmental personnel to stop child labor, the responsibilities of the concerned institutions, and the government's expectations. Reena Sharma, Additional Director Child Empowerment Department, highlighted the workshop's objectives.

During the workshop, the guests also released the table standee based on phone numbers and information on women's safety prepared by the Child Empowerment Department. Officers working in child protection from the divisional level and representatives of related organizations were present in this workshop.

Liberation from lymphoma cancer

Udaipur: A 55-year-old woman battling a serious cancer-like illness has gotten rid of the disease after being treat-

ed at the Pacific Medical College and Hospital, Bhikha Bedla. The patient was diagnosed with lymphoma, a form of blood cancer, due to lymphoma in the eye. The patient's vision was lost, but due to the precise treatment of experienced doctor Manoj Mahajan, the patient has been completely cured. The patient's eye has been cured without any surgery. There is good news for everyone. Complete treatment has been done under the Bhamashah scheme.

Dr. Manoj Mahajan, an oncologist at Pacific Medical College and Hospital, said that when the patient first came for consultation, it had been two years after taking treatment here and there, and with time, the condition of the patient was getting worse. The eyes had become less visible as the swelling increased. Depending on the age and disease of the patient, two procedures, radiation or targeted therapy, could be used for the treatment of lymphoma. Targeted elimination CD20 in the disease therapy was selected. After eight months of treatment, the patient has completely recovered and can see clearly in the eyes. No surgery has been done to cure the patient. Mahajan said that 5-10 percent of the total cancer patients are affected by lymphoma. This is a kind of lump that can occur in any part of the body and, in the future, can take the form of blood cancer. By getting diagnosed on time and starting treatment, the life of patients in the fourth stage of this disease can also be saved. The patient and family said that before Dr. Mahajan's treatment, they had lost their eyesight and hope of life, but they were right. Due to the treatment, the eyesight has returned, and the disease has also ended. Due to the availability of such treatment facilities in South Rajasthan,
