# Inauguration of 62nd All India Wheat and **Barley Research Workshop**

Udaipur. Dr. Himanshu Pathak, Director-General of the Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) and Secretary of the Department of Agricultural Research and Education, New Delhi, inaugurated the 62nd All India Wheat and Barley Research Workshop at Maharana Pratap University of Agriculture and Technology in Udaipur. The workshop was organized in collaboration with the Wheat and Barley Research Institute of India, Karnal (Haryana), with the participation of more than four hundred agricultural scientists from various countries and institutions

Dr. Pathak emphasized the importance of continuous research and innovation in the field of wheat and barley production, despite the significant progress made in recent years. He stressed the need for scientists to address the challenges posed by changing global climatic conditions. He mentioned that while India has achieved self-sufficiency in wheat production, there is still room for improvement, especially in developing high-protein and high-yielding varieties that can withstand adverse weather conditions. ### The focus on eco-friendly elections

In light of the significant use of single-use plastic and non-biodegradable campaign materials during elections, the Election Commission of India has expressed concerns about the environmental damage caused by such materials. The Commission has released comprehensive guidelines to promote eco-friendly elections this time.

According to the directives of the Election Commission of India, the Election Department of Rajasthan has issued instructions to all district election officials and returning officers to adhere to the Commission's orders. Chief Electoral Officer of Rajasthan, Praveen Gupta, stated that the Election Commission has consistently issued guidelines to make elections more eco-friendly. The Commission is deeply concerned about the environmental risks posed by the use of non-biodegradable materials during elections. Since 1999, the Commission has been urging political parties and candidates to refrain from using plastic polythene for creating posters, banners, etc., during election campaigns. In this regard, the Ministry of Environment, Forest, and Climate Change has amended the Plastic Waste Management Rules 2016, banning the manufacture, import, stocking, distribution, sale, and use of single-use plastics including polyethylene and expanded polystyrene from July 1, 2022. The directive also emphasizes that any expenses incurred by local authorities in the enforcement of these laws during campaign activities will be collected from candidates or political parties. The protection of the environment is not an individual responsibility but a collective one. The Chief Electoral Officer highlighted that materials such as posters, cut-outs, hoardings, and political advertisements often use plastic, which becomes waste after elections, contributing to pollution of land, water, and air. To address this, the Commission advocates for the use of alternative materials such as compostable plastics, natural fabrics, and recyclable paper

The upcoming elections are seen as an excellent opportunity to bring practical changes in campaign practices. The Chief Electoral Officer has directed district election officials and returning officers to thoroughly study the Commission's notifications regarding banned plastics, provide copies of guidelines to candidates during nomination, and ensure strict compliance with the directives during the upcoming 2023 state assembly elections.

Promoting eco-friendly practices in elections not only helps preserve the environment but also demonstrates a collective commitment to safeguarding our planet.
