PMCH Doctors Save Life of 3-Year-Old Girl by Removing Peanut from Windpipe

Udaipur: A team of ENT specialists at Pacific Medical College & Hospital (PMCH), Udaipur, successfully saved the life of a 3-year-old girl by removing a peanut lodged in her windpipe using bronchoscopy, a rare and life-saving intervention.

The child, Shivanya, a resident of Rajsamand, accidentally inhaled a peanut while eating 25–30 at once. She soon developed fever, chest pain, throat swelling, and breathing difficulties. Initially taken to a local doctor, her condition remained unchanged, prompting her family to rush her to PMCH.

ENT expert Dr. Shiv Kaushik promptly ordered a CT scan, which revealed a foreign object lodged in the main bronchial tubes of both lungs, restricting her airflow. Without delay, a medical team opted for bronchoscopy and successfully removed the peanut, saving the child's life without the need for surgery.

The complex and delicate procedure was performed under general anesthesia through the mouth using a special endoscopic device. Given her young age, traditional surgery was ruled out as too risky.

The successful operation was carried out by the ENT team including Dr. Shiv Kaushik, Dr. Richa Gupta, Dr. Mahesh, Dr. Shweta, Dr. Drishti, Dr. Ruchika, Dr. Ishita, Dr. Anil, and support staff Subhash Sharma, Dinesh, and Heeralal. Intensive care support in the PICU was managed by Dr. Puneet Jain, Dr. Palak, and their dedicated team.

Dr. Shiv Kaushik emphasized that children under five should be kept away from small foods like peanuts, chickpeas, almonds, and dry fruits as they may swell and block the airway if inhaled, often leading to serious complications. In severe cases, it can even be life-threatening, with 1 in 100 cases proving fatal. He advised immediate medical attention if a child shows signs like breathing trouble, bluish lips, or chest retractions.

Executive Director Aman Agrawal stated that PMCH's ENT department, equipped with world-class equipment and an expert medical team, has successfully treated over 100 similar cases in the past 1.5 years, removing seeds, LED bulbs, corn kernels, and more from children's airways.

Successful Non-Surgical Heart Hole Closure at PIMS Hospital

Udaipur: The Pacific Institute of Medical Sciences (PIMS), Umarda, has successfully treated a congenital heart defect without open-heart surgery. Under the Chiranjeevi Yojana, the procedure was performed free of cost by Senior Cardiologist Dr. Mahesh Jain and his team. The patient suffered from Patent Ductus Arteriosus (PDA), a condition where a duct between two major arteries fails to close after birth. Using a minimally invasive PDA device closure technique, the defect was sealed without any surgical incision. The operation was supported by Cardiac Anesthetist Dr. Vipin Sisodia and CTVS Surgeon Dr. Vivek Rawat.

Free speech therapy and audio-visual sessions were provided during the event, along with one-on-one progress evaluations. The emotional highlight came when parents shared their heartfelt stories—moments of hearing their child's voice for the first time, described as nothing short of a miracle.

National Lac Insect Day Celebrated at Rajasthan College of Agriculture

The Department of Entomology at Rajasthan College of Agriculture, MPUAT, Udaipur, celebrated the 4th National Lac Insect Day under the ICAR-sponsored Network Project on Genetic Conservation of Lac Insects. A one-day Student Interaction and Training Workshop on Lac Resource Production was organized, drawing participation from over 125 undergraduate, postgraduate, and doctoral students from the Faculty of Agriculture.

Dr. Hemant Swami, Project Officer, introduced the lac insect life cycle, host plants, and cultivation techniques, stressing the potential of lac farming to boost farmers' income and the importance of conserving lac insect genetics. Dr. M.K. Mehla, Professor of Entomology, highlighted the wide-ranging industrial applications of lac and its by-products—resin, wax, and dye—in sectors like cosmetics, food, pharmaceuticals, varnishes, polishes, adhesives, and textiles. He also shared modern scientific methods of lac cultivation.

The event inaugurated Productive Insect Conservation Week (May 16–22, 2025). Experts including Dr. Amit Trivedi, Dr. Virendra Singh, and Dr. Ramesh Babu emphasized the vital role of productive insects in biodiversity, advocating for the revival of lac farming in degraded regions. Essay and quiz competitions were held, with certificates awarded to winners. Additional activities like poster-making and speeches are planned throughout the week to promote awareness of lac insect conservation.

Peanut Removed, Rare Lung Case Resolved Successfully

Udaipur: In a remarkable medical breakthrough, the Pacific Institute of Medical Sciences (PIMS), Umarda, successfully treated a rare lung infection caused by a peanut lodged in a patient's airway. The patient had been battling persistent cough and breathlessness for weeks, with initial chest X-rays failing to provide clarity. Chairman Ashish Agrawal explained that a High-Resolution CT (HRCT) scan revealed a cavity in the left lung's upper lobe, bronchiectasis in the lower lobe, and ground-glass opacity in the right lung—pointing toward infection or inflammation.
